Requirements for the FSJ Visa:

- Confirmed placement with an officially recognized FSJ organization
 - For example: Red Cross (DRK), Caritas, Diakonie, AWO, etc.
 - A contract must be in place before applying for the visa.
- 2. Minimum age: 18 years (some programs allow starting at 16)
- 3. Duration: Between 6 and 18 months
- 4. Academic background is not required
 - Even professionals (e.g. engineers or university graduates) can take part in an FSJ, even if the work is not related to their field.

5. Basic German language skills

- No official level is required by law, but **A2–B1** is usually expected by organizations.
- The better the German, the higher the chances of placement and visa approval.

6. Sufficient financial support

- Usually covered through:
 - o FSJ monthly allowance (around €350–€600)

 Free accommodation and/or meals – A blocked account is **not usually required** if covered by the host organization.

7. Health insurance

- Typically arranged and paid for by the FSJ provider.

Visa Application Process

- 1. Apply to an FSJ program in Germany
- 2. Receive placement confirmation and FSJ contract
- 3. Book an appointment at the German Embassy in your country
- 4. Apply for the FSJ visa under § 19e AufenthG
- 5. Upon approval, enter Germany and start your FSJ
